

In past years Hayduk has taken an interest in the winners of the awards, but never considered herself one.

The award is a nice wrap up to the strange year she has had though, says Hayduk. She has also been battling cancer this year, which would slow down others but for Hayduk the passion is enough to keep her going.

#### **FINANCE**

To our St Andrew's Church family:

First, we want to thank those members who have faithfully been supporting the church, either through PAR, Interac transfer, or good old-fashioned cheques/cash in the mail or in the collection plate on Sunday! Consistently about 25% of our giving are PAR and the proportion of Interac has increased to almost 10% – convenient solutions for our members and the church office both. We look forward to the time when our in-person services can return to a more "normal" format – whatever the new normal may be.

At this time of year, the Board is involved in the budgeting process, and finance puts all the committee "wish lists", M&P wage requirements, and estimates of ongoing expenses like utilities and maintenance costs, into the PowerChurch program to generate a tentative budget for 2022.

Like your home/personal budget, we have a good idea what our costs are going to be.....but unlike your personal budget, our "income" is strictly dependent upon the generosity of our church family! Finance committee/board members have little to no control over that amount: only you, the congregation can decide if St. Andrew's is providing a service to you, your family, or the community at large – and donate accordingly. The church has fixed expenses (utilities, maintenance, cleaning, office equipment, etc.) whether we are in the building or not, as well as salaries, that average over \$20,000/ month.

The financials from 2020 have finally completed the audit process, and we ended that year (December 31, 2020) with an income total of \$225,813 and expenses of \$208,214 for an excess of income over expense of \$17599.

At the end of November 2021, our income total has been \$188,414 and our expenses have been \$212,612, so we are presently showing an excess of expenses over income of more than \$24,000. December has traditionally been a month of strong contributions, but we have a ways to go.....

St. Andrew's has supported other community charities by acting as a conduit for their good works. In the past year, over \$40,000 has been shared with the wider community.

Again we thank our St. Andrew's family for continuing to support our physical plant and operations with your dollars, but also for supporting our hard-working staff and volunteers – and one another! – with your prayers and connections.

Please feel free to contact anyone from the finance committee with any concerns that you may have, or any suggestions for how we may take advantage of government programs that we may have missed.

We are all volunteers together, so we do what we can to make this family stronger and happier together!

#### **ADVENT 3**

#### SUNDAY, DECEMBER 12: 10:30 AM

Sunday Worship: This Sunday, Sunday of Joy, we'll look at Genesis 28: 10-17. This is the story of "Jacob's Ladder," the time when Jacob, fleeing from the wrath of his brother, stopped for the night at a holy place, without knowing it, and encountered God in a dream. The story behind this story is interesting. What Jacob stole from his brother was a blessing, the blessing of their father Isaac. But what both brothers learned through their lives is that they each had their own blessing, and that God was with them both. In the end. Jacob restored to his brother Esau the blessing he supposedly stole, recognizing that God's blessing is deeper than anything that can be taken away. Our practice this week is **blessing** - offering the no - strings - attached goodwill of God to another (and recognizing it in ourselves), even in times that seem hard. It's funny: you'd think it was being blessed that would bring joy, but as Jacob found out, it's actually offering blessing that often creates more joy in us.



#### **ADVENT 4**

#### SUNDAY, DECEMBER 19: 10:30 AM

Sunday Worship: We're getting close to Christmas now! This Sunday, the Sunday of Love, we'll be looking at Luke 1:46-55, the passage known as the Magnificat. It's actually a controversial passage, about the reversal of fortune that Jesus often talked about - the last becoming first, and the first last. That may sound threatening, at first - especially for people like most of us, who are relatively prosperous. The rich sent away empty? That sounds bad. And yet...a little bit of "empty" for those of us whose lives are over-full may be just what the doctor ordered. This Sunday we'll try to lift our perspective to consider the common good. What may seem challenging at first may turn out to be the best for all of us! Our practice this week: seeking the common good, or, in a word, living in love. Sometimes, in the dark, we may feel lonely and isolated. But once again, we may discover that what makes us most alive and what banishes loneliness is not the receiving of love, but the giving.





#### **BLUE CHRISTMAS**

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 21: 7PM

Tonight is the longest night of the year, and it's often when we celebrate "Blue Christmas." We know that Christmas is not merry for all of us, all the time - and this year, depending on our ability to gather as families, it may be harder still. So this night we recognize that Christmas can be hard for many reasons - grief, family strife, unemployment, COVID, illness... Still: Jesus was born to poor parents, in a stable, in an occupied territory. If Christmas is hard, Jesus was born exactly for us.

This is the celebration of the birth of Christ, the incarnation of God - God with us.
