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

### Giving Up "Normal" For Lent 2022!



#### REFLECTION

Lent is the penitential season that runs from Ash Wednesday (this year, March 2) until Easter (this year, April 17. Mardi Gras, or Shrove Tuesday, is the celebration that traditionally happens to clear out the cupboards in preparation for the season of fasting! And the spiritual practice of fasting is what gives rise to the idea of "giving up" something for Lent.

This year, as we hopefully move into the end of the COVID-19 pandemic, we long for a return to "normal" – meaning, a return to gathering together, going for coffee and meals, travel maybe, being indoors without a mask... But as we speak about normal, we are also aware that what we have called "normal" is very problematic. It's environmentally unsustainable, it's full of conflict and racism and sexism and economic disparity. While many of us are relatively privileged, normal is also often stressful, over busy, and frankly unhappy.

We long for normal but we know we really can't go back to normal. So this Lent, we're going to try to give up "normal" for Lent. We'll try to let go of some of the aspects of normal that are dragging us down, and to find (and practice) a new normal. We'll try to do that in a number of ways, but in particular we're inviting you to look at stories and practices.

We understand the world through stories. An exhausted emergency room nurse sees public health rules in the context of larger and deeper story, of which they are a part. A participant in the trucker protests sees those same public health rules in the context of a very different story. In worship, we're going to try to look at our own deep stories and beliefs, to see how they undergird "normal." We'll look at how those stories are in conflict with Jesus, and we'll try to find better, more faithful stories. Perhaps by changing our core stories, we'll change normal.

We'll also look at practices, on the understanding that how we practice determines who we become. We'll invite you to try out one or more spiritual practices this Lent that might lead us towards a healthier, more faithful normal – and to support each other along the way! So far in 2022 the board met on January 11, January 24, and February 8. These meetings have been by Zoom. The next meeting will be in-person and held on March 8.

The board will decide at the March 8 meeting what next steps will be taken towards the continued opening of St. Andrew's.

The general feeling of most of our congregation still seems to be one of caution. At this time, we have 30 to 35 attending in-person, and social distancing still being followed. Many are following the worship services through YouTube or Facebook. I get the feeling that even when masks are no longer required, many who attend church will feel more comfortable wearing them. It will be up to all of us to respect the wishes of those who wish to wear masks or not, and to respect those who still would like to continue to social distance.

Live streaming continues to be popular. St. Andrew's is averaging over 150 views (some days over 200) for our Sunday morning worship services. People from across Canada and the U.S.A. tune into St. Andrew's. We are able to live-stream funerals and weddings and have several weddings scheduled that have requested to be live-streamed.

St. Andrew's is looking for individuals willing to learn a bit about the sound system and computer in the sanctuary. Training is available and you can work alongside junior and senior high school students who are easy to spend time with. If interested, let Jana in the office know.

The Annual General Meeting is scheduled to be held in-person on Sunday, March 27, 2022. Reports and financial information will be available at least one week before the meeting.

If you feel called to do some church service, such as taking part on one of the ad hoc teams that spring up, sit on one of the teams: Worship, Christian Development, Outreach, Congregational Life, Affirm, Finance, Ministry and Personnel, Property, or UCW or, wish to take a role as a voting member on the Board, please talk to someone on the Board, or let Jana in the office know. We will be voting new members in at the Annual General Meeting.



Verna Doreen Schmidt November 2, 1931 - February 5, 2022





### Worship for Lent 2022!

### ASH WEDNESDAY MARCH 2, 7:30 PM

Scripture: John 12:20–28. "Gardeners don't fear death" – reflection on the changeability of everything, and the cycle of death and resurrection into which Jesus invites us.

As we think about "giving up normal for Lent," we recognize the potential pain in leaving what may have been comfortable or beneficial to us individually. However, we also recognize the "glorification" in this process – that this is an invitation into abundance of life.

### LENT 1 MARCH 6, 10:30 AM

Acts 11: 1-18 and Acts 10: 28. There is in "normal" an assumption of a hierarchy of cultures and religions. We tend to assume that white Western European consumer industrial culture is the pinnacle of "civilization" and that Christianity is the pinnacle of religion.

But in this story the Jew, Peter, actually breaks Jewish law to go to Cornelius' house, and break bread with the Gentiles there. And he finds that God is already present there, in a different culture/religion. "Giving up normal" might involve giving up our sense of cultural and religious superiority, and looking upon others with curiosity and respect.

## Pie Day Worship Public, Intentional, Explicit Led by Affirm

#### LENT 2 MARCH 13, 10:30 AM

We'll be giving up normal, as we do a somewhat different worship service this week to be public, intentional, and explicit about our Affirming status as a church!

Plans are still being made, but we also hope to share ACTUAL PIE to celebrate this day. Our decision to become an affirming church is one that took us away from normal in more than one way – but which has proven crucial to our faithfulness to the gospel.

### LENT 3 MARCH 20, 10:30 AM

Mark 10: 35-45. A HUGE part of "normal" is what we sometimes call the American Dream – the idea of upward mobility. It is expected that through our lives, we will become more and more prosperous, acquire more and more stuff, rise in our careers to have more and more responsibility and an ever-higher salary.

The pervasive advertising that is part of our consumer society encourages us to be always dissatisfied with who we are, where we are, what we have – and to upgrade. But this is driving us to environmental disaster, leaving us unhappy, and forcing us into competition with one another for ever-fewer "high places" in the human hierarchy.

Jesus refused human hierarchies over and over, and constantly challenged the idea of "more" as "better." Far from upward mobility, he encouraged downward. Giving up normal might mean giving up our desire for more privilege, and exchanging it for a desire for deeper service. That just might make us a whole lot happier and healthier!

### LENT 4 MARCH 27. 10:30 AM

Genesis 2:4-9 and 15-25. In our technological and colonial society, we have an interesting view of nature, land, and the Creation around us. To white society, what matters is humanity (and historically, not even all of humanity). All else are simply "resources" for us to use as we see fit. Alas, in our own Scripture is the command to "fill the earth and subdue it," which we seem to have done with a vengeance.

The result is an economic system that regards the undeveloped earth as of no value, and sees the earth as an unlimited source of resources, and an unlimited repository for waste.

But Scripture (and, particularly, indigenous spiritualities) also see us as creatures of the earth, one part of a creation God loves and regards as good, and our original task on earth was to be gardeners of Creation.

Giving up normal might involve giving up seeing ourselves as separate from the earth, and learning to see all of Creation as sacred, beloved, and of value in itself.

### Worship for Lent 2022!

#### LENT 5 APRIL 3. 10:30 AM

Matthew 6: 9-15. Way back when Constantine legalized Christianity, he also institutionalized it. He made Christianity what it never was – an imperial religion. In Jesus' day, the Empire saw him as an enemy – he challenged the Empire's systems and actions, their justice and compassion. To silence this criticism, the Empire encouraged Christianity to be concerned not with this world but the next world.

The popular idea of "the separation of Church and State" (which is usually quite misunderstood) is that the church shouldn't be involved in politics – it should stick to getting people into heaven, to religion.

But Jesus' prayer is that God's will be done on earth. His preaching centered around what he called the Kingdom of God, that not-completely-realizable but still near-at-hand vision of society as God would have it be. The language is political: the kingdom of God, and Jesus as Lord are set directly against the normal language of the kingdom and lordship of Caesar.

Jesus' teaching (and that of the prophets and priests) is very much this-worldly, and includes concern for politics – how society is structured and ordered.

Giving up normal might well involve giving up our sense that the purpose of religion is to prop up the status quo, and taking up the idea that we are a counter-culture, a people who live and proclaim a different, more compassionate social order.
